Aide Memoire: Further advice on Business Growth Agenda Budget 2017 initiatives

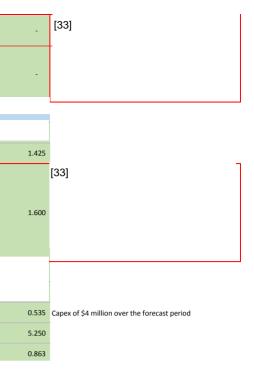

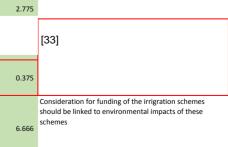
