Aide Memoire: Budget 2015 Initiatives in the BGA Exports Workstream

Purpose

The purpose of this note is to support a discussion amongst Export Ministers on the relative priority of Budget initiatives that relate to the Export Markets workstream of the Business Growth Agenda (BGA).

The following tables outline the relevant initiatives and the Treasury's advice on their value for money, links to BGA objectives, and the degree of pre-commitment or discretion over progressing the initiative.

The Treasury assessments focus on the merits of the initiatives as they stand. Once each of the BGA Ministerial groups has discussed the initiatives, Budget Ministers will consider options for prioritised packages across the BGA to fit into the available allowance. We are looking to develop packages of \$0-\$100 million in net terms.

Budget 2015 context

- The emphasis of Budget 2015 is to target children in material deprivation as well as continued focus on results and improving public sector performance.
- There are a large number of initiatives that have been submitted in Budget 2015. In total, there is around \$1.8 billion to \$2.1 billion a year of operating pressures, of which \$215 million to \$265 million are BGA-related initiatives.
- Funding all initiatives would require active reprioritisation, significant savings and/or revenue increases.

- Within this workstream, there are around \$20 million per annum of operating pressures. To support a discussion on priorities we outline some suggested discussion points on options and key trade-offs below.

Suggested issues for discussion

- **Managing increased cross-border people flows.** A higher number of people are travelling across New Zealand's borders, partly in response to government policy to encourage tourism, business travel and international education. With the current level of border resources, higher volumes are expected to both lengthen the time it will take to process passengers, as well as increase the potential that high-risk people may enter/leave the country.

Given there is no 'ideal' level of service provision or risk management, do Ministers consider there are areas of high risk where additional funding should be prioritised towards?

Do Ministers wish to investigate the potential for further sharing of intelligence resources rather than funding it separately?

- **Tourism, trade and promotion activities,** including cycle trails, convention centres and the NZ Story. These initiatives are broadly targeted at increasing visitor numbers or experiences. The Treasury considers that these initiatives are discretionary and their value for money is unclear as there is little information about their expected impact or pay-off.

Within this set of initiatives, are there any that Ministers would prioritise given pressures on the Budget allowance?

Key links to other BGA workstreams include the Christchurch convention centre which is part of the Canterbury rebuild initiatives being considered by Infrastructure Ministers. In addition the Natural Resources Ministers will consider a Ministry of Primary Industries initiative in relation to biosecurity management.

Other possible discussion points include:

- Given Budget pressures, how critical are the initiatives for delivering on BGA goals and refresh priorities?
- What trade-offs would need to be made to progress initiatives within baselines?
