Overview of the Vote

The Minister for Courts is responsible for appropriations in Vote Courts for the 2015/16 financial year, covering the following:

- a total of \$460 million (64% of the Vote) on purchasing services (mostly support for managing cases, claims and applications through courts and tribunals, and the collection and enforcement of fines and civil debts) from the Ministry of Justice
- a total of \$130 million (18% of the Vote) on purchasing services from non-departmental providers. The major part of the appropriation covers costs incurred under various Acts, and
- a total of \$129 million (18% of the Vote) on non-departmental expenditure to cover judges' and coroners' salaries and allowances.

The imposition of \$185 million of fines, offender levies, contributions towards lawyer for child costs, and other penalties imposed through the courts is expected during the 2015/16 financial year.

Details of these appropriations are set out in Parts 2-4.



Output Expenses

Departmental output expenses are forecast to increase from \$444 million in 2014/15 to \$460 million in 2015/16. This is mainly due to increased funding for capital charge related to Christchurch Justice and Emergency Services Precinct, additional funding to manage high priority initiatives, lower levels of targeted efficiency savings, and transfers from 2014/15 for domestic violence initiatives. This is partially offset by one-off funding in 2014/15 from the Justice Sector Fund for the Modernising Courts programme. Expenses are expected to decrease to \$445 million in 2016/17, and remain relatively stable in future years with the Ministry aiming to manage cost pressures through productivity and efficiency savings, as well as reprioritising funding where appropriate.

Other Expenses

The non-departmental other expenses are forecast to increase from \$249 million in 2014/15 to \$259 million in 2015/16. This increase is mainly due to new funding received for the implementation of the Vulnerable Children legislation. While expenses are expected to remain relatively constant for 2016/17 and 2017/18 at \$264 million, they are anticipated to increase to \$269 million in 2018/19. This increase is mainly due to changes in the expected impairment level of fines and enforcement fees imposed.

In 2013/14, when the forecast for 2014/15 was set, new cases had been trending upwards, and this was reflected in the 2014/15 forecast. Service provisions have since fallen, and this is reflected in the forecast for 2015/16.

Note 2 - The services provided are demand driven and dependent on the type of cases before the court.

Note 3 - Completion of the survey is not compulsory.

Note 4 - The services provided include court appointed counsel, such as lawyer for child, lawyer to assist the court and specialist report writers. These services are demand driven and professional service providers are engaged when the Judge determines there is a need. An application can have more than one type of service provision appointment. The forecast for 2014/15 underestimated the effect of the family justice reforms. The forecast for 2015/16 has been based on the actual demand in 2014/15. However as the family justice reforms are bedded in, the overall trend may change.

The scale for responses is a five-point satisfaction scale.

Note 5 - Levels of new business have reduced more than anticipated. The forecast for 2015/16 has been adjusted to reflect this.

Note 6 - Levels of new business have been impacted by family justice reforms. The reduction in Care of Children Act applications has been greater than forecast.

Note 7 - The high variance is due to the low volume of business in Supreme Court.

Note 8 - The reduction is as result of Criminal Procedure Act 2011 coming into effect, which is causing a shift in appellate workloads between the Court of Appeal and the High Court. For example, pre-trial applications on District Court jury trials are now filed in the High Court. Furthermore, there has been a decline in jury trials disposed in both the High Court and the District Courts.

Note 9 - New training regulations have affected the Authority's ability to achieve this measure. Applicants are issued a temporary certificate within seven days, but a full certificate cannot be issued until evidence of training is provided.

Reasons for Change in Appropriation

Collection and Enforcement of Fines and Civil Debts Services

The increase in this category of \$1.850 million for 2015/16 is mainly due to additional funding received to manage the Ministry's high priority initiatives and a lower level of targeted efficiency savings, which are partially offset by a transfer from the Justice Sector Fund in 2014/15 for the Modernising Courts programme.

District Court Services

The increase in this category of \$9.821 million for 2015/16 is mainly due to additional funding received to manage the Ministry's high priority initiatives, increased funding for capital charge on the capital contribution for the Christchurch Justice and Emergency Services Precinct build, expense transfers from 2014/15 to 2015/16 for domestic violence initiatives, and a lower level of targeted efficiency savings. This is partially offset by a transfer from the Justice Sector Fund in 2014/15 for the Modernising Courts programme.

Higher Court Services

The increase in this category of \$1.294 million for 2015/16 is mainly due to additional funding received to manage the Ministry's high priority initiatives, increased funding for capital charge on the capital contribution for the Christchurch Justice and Emergency Services Precinct build, and a lower level of targeted efficiency savings. This is partially offset by a transfer from the Justice Sector Fund in 2014/15 for the Modernising Courts programme.

Specialist Courts, Tribunals and Other Authorities Services

The increase in this category of \$1.965 million for 2015/16 is mainly due to additional funding received to manage the Ministry's high priority initiatives, increased funding for capital charge on the capital contribution for the Christchurch Justice and Emergency Services Precinct build and a lower level of targeted efficiency savings. This is partially offset by a transfer from the Justice Sector Fund in 2014/15 for the Modernising Courts programme and an expense transfer from 2013/14 to 2014/15 for the Waitangi Tribunal's historical District Inquiry programme.
