### **Treasury Report:** Update on Areas of Focus for MSD Baseline Review

### Purpose of Report

- 1. The Treasury and the Ministry of Social Development (MSD) are jointly undertaking a baseline review of MSD. The review will provide an interim report in late November and a final report by 31 January 2019. The review is governed by a Steering Group comprising equal representation of MSD and Treasury managers.
- 2. This report provides an update on the areas of focus for the MSD baseline review, including areas where potential reprioritisation may be identified. We have recommended that you refer this to other Vote Social Development Ministers to ensure they are aware of this before receiving the interim report in late November.

#### Overview of Baseline Review

- 3. You have previously agreed terms of reference for the baseline review jointly (T2018/1956 refers). The terms of reference set objectives, scope and governance arrangements.
- 4. The objectives of the baseline review are to understand current spending, develop a picture of the future baseline requirements for MSD and to enable it to have adequate resources, in the right places, to deliver on its strategy and the Government's wellbeing priorities. The review will advise on:
  - a. value for money and the effectiveness of expenditure (including services both delivered by the Ministry and contracted out to third party providers)
  - b. alignment of baseline expenditure to MSD's strategy and the Government's wellbeing priorities
  - c. cost pressures over the next few years and their alignment to strategy and priorities (including workforce issues, ICT functions and general overheads), and
  - d. options to manage within different funding paths.
- 5. The scope of the review is \$1.4 billion of Vote Social Development, which includes MSD's departmental and non-departmental operating expenditure and departmental capital expenditure. Benefit expenditure is out of scope. While \$1.4 billion is within scope of the review, areas of focus have been identified, which means not all appropriations that make up the \$1.4 billion will undergo deep analysis or be considered for reprioritisation.
- 6. Due to the link between the baseline review and the Budget 2019 prioritisation exercise, the Minister of Finance previously agreed that prioritisation options for portfolios in scope of the review will be considered through the baseline review process (T2018/2535 refers).

### Areas of Focus

7. In order to maximise the value of the review within the available timeframe, areas of focus have been identified. The review team followed three steps to identify the areas of focus:

- a. using an 'activity-view' of the baseline, and choosing a dimension of analysis best suited for the drivers of each activity
- b. removing appropriations that are subject to an existing review, or unlikely to warrant deep analysis, and
- c. applying a materiality threshold of \$1.5 million to appropriations.
- 8. The two key dimensions of analysis are efficiency and effectiveness:
  - a. **Efficiency**: The appropriations that administer the benefit system will be mainly assessed for their efficiency.
  - b. **Effectiveness**: The appropriations that provide services to achieve employment and community outcomes will be mainly assessed for their effectiveness in delivering those outcomes.
- 9. The review team will also focus on two cross-cutting themes:
  - c. **Remuneration and overheads**: Recent cost pressure bids have been chiefly driven by remuneration and overheads.
  - d. **IT and capital**: MSD's medium-term strategy and ability to efficiently administer the benefit system are likely to have significant capital implications.
- 10. The Steering Group endorsed these areas of focus on 5 October.
- 11. Appendix A outlines the appropriations that the review team will and will not focus on, and how the appropriations map to the 'activity view' and the dimension of analysis. Appendix B outlines the appropriation Ministers and whether their appropriation is an area of focus or not.

### **Next Steps**

12. The review team are now undertaking more detailed analysis on each of the areas of focus. This analysis will inform the November 2018 report back to Ministers.
