	Topic	Comment	Team Name and Contact	Recommendations and Minister's Feedback
1.	Proposed changes to public housing funding settings	<p>The Ministry of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is drafting advice to Minister Woods (noting for Associate Housing Ministers) to implement changes to public housing funding settings to deliver on the Public Housing Plan over 2021-2024. We are working with HUD on the proposed changes, including whether we need to seek your agreement as Minister of Finance, or Cabinet approval.</p> <p>Key themes in the draft advice include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The concept of "additionality", and whether this should include houses which are purchased and do not add to New Zealand's net housing stock. We recommend the definition of additionality is limited to net additions to New Zealand's housing stock.</li> <li>Minister Woods has asked HUD for a path out of purchasing existing houses (also known as "redirects" or "buy-ins"). HUD is proposing a phase out of purchasing existing housing to deliver places in the Public Housing Plan by mid-2022. We are engaging with HUD on whether there is a faster option, and to identify any risks or cons of a faster move to a construction-only pipeline.</li> </ul>	Housing & Urban Growth John Beaglehole, <sup>[39]</sup>	
2.	Update on review of the <i>Unit Titles Act 2010</i>	<p>Last week we noted that the Treasury provided feedback to HUD on its proposed approach to a review of the <i>Unit Titles Act 2010</i> (UTA). We suggested that a review of the UTA include its insurance provisions and the types of rules that bodies corporate can set. In its final advice, HUD did <b>not</b> recommend inclusion of these aspects in a review of the UTA.</p> <p>We understand that the Government has decided to support a Member's Bill to reform the UTA, which will mean a review of the UTA is unlikely to proceed in the near term. The Member's Bill is broadly aligned with the changes previously agreed by Cabinet in 2017 but does not address the UTA's insurance requirements. By way of background:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The UTA requires bodies corporate to insure their buildings to their "full insurable value."</li> <li>The requirement to insure to the full insurable value can contribute to financial distress for unit title owners.</li> <li>HUD has previously advised against any changes to this requirement.</li> <li>HUD is drafting guidance on how a body corporate can satisfy the full insurable value requirement if replacement cover is unavailable or particularly expensive, although progress has been slow due to other priorities.</li> </ul> <p>If the review were proceeding, we would have recommended it include consideration of whether the UTA's insurance requirements are appropriate. Given the Member's Bill is proceeding (likely instead of a review), and we understand it may be difficult to change the Bill, it could be worthwhile to prioritise the work on guidance for bodies corporate on insurance requirements under the UTA.</p>	Housing and Urban Growth Gabrielle Groube, <sup>[39]</sup>  Financial Markets Amir Mehta, <sup>[39]</sup>	We recommend that you meet with the Associate Minister of Housing (Minister Poto Williams) if you would like to progress matters related to insurance requirements under the UTA.

3.	Newly announced OAG review	On 23 February OAG published information about an upcoming performance audit looking at the central response to Covid-19. This review will be looking at how well co-ordinated the response has been, and how lessons learned through the response to date have been implemented. 4.	National Adaptation Plan – Climate Change	<p>Under the Climate Change Response Act, the Government must prepare a National Adaptation Plan (NAP) by August 2022 setting out how it will address climate risks identified by the National Climate Change Risk Assessment (NCCRA). This is an all-of-government plan coordinated by the Ministry for the Environment.</p> <p>Some risks identified in the NCCRA are relevant to your portfolios. They include risks to infrastructure, including direct impacts on transport, communication, energy, waste, water and social infrastructure assets, and consequential social, economic, cultural and financial impacts.</p> <p>The NAP's proposed strategic direction is divided into a set of outcomes and objectives reflecting these risks. The Treasury and MBIE are currently co-leading an Economy and Financial system outcome, though other agencies will have responsibility for addressing some of the relevant risks. Te Waihanga is coordinating the workstream focussed on infrastructure, with contribution from 12 other agencies responsible for infrastructure funding, delivery and operation.</p> <p>In late March the Minister of Climate Change will report back to Cabinet on the scope and approach of the NAP, with the intention to start the next phase of the NAP in April. We will brief you on that draft Cabinet paper in the next 2 – 3 weeks.</p>	Transitions, Regions and Economic Development Udayan Mukherjee, <sup>[35]</sup>

<p><b>COVID-19 response</b></p>	<p><b>Response to current cases</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Cabinet decided on Monday 22 February to return Auckland to Alert Level 1. The Resurgence Support Payment (RSP) opened for applications on Tuesday 23 February. As of 7:30am on Thursday 25 February, Inland Revenue has received 9,466 applications for the RSP. The total amount requested is \$28.24 million, with an average of \$2,983.49 requested per application.</li> <li>A draft Cabinet paper is ready to activate the Wage Subsidy Scheme (WSS) in the event of future Alert Level escalations, if necessary. This paper reflects the settings for the scheme that were agreed by Cabinet in December, including that the 40% revenue decline eligibility test will be measured in comparison to a typical 14-day period in the six weeks prior to the Alert Level escalation. Officials will report back in the next few weeks on operational and minor policy details that the December Cabinet paper delegated to joint Ministers to confirm.</li> </ul> <p><b>Elimination Strategy</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Minister Hipkins is currently considering the draft of a Cabinet paper on the direction for the elimination strategy over 2021. We expect the paper to be submitted to Cabinet in 2-3 weeks. It is an important opportunity to ensure cross-agency efforts focus on the things that will have the biggest impact, including on economic performance and recovery.</li> </ul> <p><b>Immunisation</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On 1 March, Cabinet will consider whether and how to provide a payment to support paid time off in case of adverse reactions to COVID-19 vaccination. The advice was requested by Cabinet during previous decisions to adopt a multi-faceted approach to maximising vaccine uptake (CAB-21-MIN-0019 refers), and is led by MBIE in consultation with MSD, MOH and Treasury.</li> </ul> <p><b>Borders</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Following recent advice and discussion, the Treasury will report back on 4 March on the key questions relating to the border and information on the economic impacts of border settings.</li> <li>DPMC is coordinating the development of advice on the border strategy for Minister Hipkins in early March. This advice will bring together a range of considerations for the year ahead (including vaccine certification and the potential for risk-based approaches at the border). We are working closely with DPMC as we consider the border strategy to be very significant for economic performance and recovery.</li> <li>Minister Hipkins is planning to submit a Cabinet paper on all three safe travel zones for likely consideration in the week of 8 March.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Response to current cases</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Advice on operational and minor policy details for the WSS – due March.</li> </ul> <p><b>Borders</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Advice on the border - due 4 March.</li> </ul>

You will receive a paper proposing recommend priority projects for monitoring next week.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Public Finance System Modernisation</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Report to support your first meetings with cluster Ministers in March – due next week. [33]</li> <li>Advice on draft Terms of Reference for the cluster spending reviews - due March.</li> </ul> <p><b>Ensuring Delivery</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Briefing on recommended priority projects for monitoring by the IU - due next week.</li> </ul>	
<p><b>Sustainability</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On 31 January, the Climate Change Commission (CCC) published its draft package of advice with recommended emissions budgets and an emissions reduction plan for New Zealand. Responding to the CCC will be a major part of the Government's emissions mitigation policy in 2021. The Treasury is currently analysing the detailed recommendations and evidence published by the Commission.</li> <li>Agencies invited by you have submitted Budget initiatives relating to a coherent package of climate change initiatives for Budget 2021. The Ministry for the Environment (MfE) is currently coordinating advice on how the overall package can meet some coherent policy criteria as was requested by the Minister of Finance, including alignment with the draft advice of the CCC. The Treasury will be involved in the development of this cross-agency advice as it forms its own assessments of the submitted initiatives.</li> <li>You are meeting with the Minister for Climate Change on 10 March to discuss a strategic framework for the funding and financing of climate transition. This meeting will inform a joint Cabinet paper on this topic you are scheduled to discuss with Cabinet in April 2021, and Treasury and MfE will jointly prepare a briefing to support you at the meeting.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Pre-meeting briefing to support the meeting between you and the Minister for Climate Change on 10 March – due late February/early March.</li> </ul>

It is expected that a version of this paper will be sent to Ministers for consultation in the last week of February/first week of March.</li> <li>The Treasury has been working closely with the Transition Unit to understand the nature of the proposals that will be included in the Cabinet paper. On the detail seen to date, we are broadly comfortable with current proposals. We will provide further advice alongside Cabinet paper consultation. A related Budget bid to support early decisions has been received.</li> </ul>

<b>Housing</b>	<p><b>Supply interventions related to housing affordability</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>HUD are progressing work on a draft Cabinet paper on proposed supply interventions. We met with you on 23 February to discuss the paper and following that meeting, provided further advice on 24 February.
